Local society ladies gathered often for gala luncheons

This photograph catches for all time a meeting of the Bungalow Apron Club of St. Lucie County. Every month from 1927 to 1943 a group of society ladies of Fort Pierce met at the home of one of its members. The hostess made a table centerpiece to be admired, showed off her best china and prepared a menu to impress her guests.

The meeting in the photograph shows hostess Mrs. Daniel Tobin (Frances) McCarty at the head of the table in the McCarty home that once graced Indian River Drive. She was the mother of Gov. Dan McCarty. The photograph was taken Nov. 30, 1932. Standing at her side is Adeline Adderly. The McCartys built Adeline a house that still stands on Avenue B. Mrs. Adderly's grandchildren lost all the

photographs they treasured of their grandmother so as far as we know this is the only existing likeness of that remarkable woman.

The ladies, from left to right are:

Mary Summerlin. Her husband, Clarence, was a boatman and farmer.

Blanche Harris. The 1926 Fort Pierce City Directory lists William H. Harris with wife Blanche S. at Harris Insurance Agency, 215 North Second Street. By 1935, the agency had become the Harris-Haynes Insurance Company with D. C. Haynes, president and Blanche Harris, secretary-treasurer.

Mary Elinor Ordway. Charles F. Ordway worked for East Coast Lumber before becoming Deputy

Retired music educator makes valuable donations

One of the Treasure Coast's most-admired music educators and choirmasters recently made several valuable contributions to the preservation of this area's history and culture.

Earl F. Little, at age 92, has moved to Alabama to live closer to a daughter. Before he departed in early August, Little gave his collection of Lincoln Park Academy yearbooks to the St. Lucie Historical Society for inclusion in our archives. The 24 volumes span the years 1945 through 1970.

For most of that time, St. Lucie County's public schools were racially segregated. The photos in those long-ago volumes include many local African-American youth who have become active in the business and professional life of our communities.


The 1945 yearbook, published while World War Two still raged, said: "We dedicate this volume to our parents, guardians and former students who are away in the service of our country." This was followed by notes from 23 LPA alumni serving in the U.S. military around the world.

Little, who earned degrees from the Oberlin Conservatory and the University of Michigan, appears first in the 1956 LPA yearbook, pictured among young faculty members. For many years he was chorus director at Lincoln Park Academy, and later at Fort Pierce Central High School. In addition, Little served

as choir director for several area churches. He also was chorus master for many Treasure Coast Opera productions.

The LPA y e a r b o o k collection will be available for viewing in the SLHS archives at the museum.

Little also generously donated his

collection of recordings by the Lincoln Park Academy chorus to WQCS 88.9 fm, Indian River State College's public radio station. Each year, Little's chorus recorded a concert performance on vinyl discs. These recordings, rich with cultural value for this area, will be maintained in the station's music library. Δ

Marx, diver and archaeologist, had an adventure-packed life

Robert F. "Bob" Marx, sometimes called "the father of underwater archaeology," died July 4 at his home in Indialantic. He was 82 and had lived a life of adventure on and under the world's oceans.

Born in Pittsburgh in 1936, Marx was a Marine Corps scuba diving instructor and later pursued a career as a treasure hunter, undersea explorer and historical researcher. He is credited with discovering the remains of the Spanish galleon Nuestra Senora de las Maravillas, wrecked in 1656 off Grand Bahama

Island. He also took part in archaeological excavation of the sunken city of Port Royal, for the government of Jamaica.

Marx wrote dozens of books and magazine articles, and consulted for television programs. Δ

Florida Facts

Casa Caprona Apartments north of Fort Pierce were built in 1926 during the great Florida land boom. During World War Two it became married officers' quarters for those stationed at the amphibious training base. Still in existence, Casa Caprona is in the National Register of Historic Places. (World War II in Florida by Robert A. Taylor)

Remembrances

Clayton Carlton Humphries

A descendant of one of this area's pioneer ranching families, Clayton Carlton Humphries, died on July 21. He was 34 years old. Survivors include his son, Jaxen Heath Alexander; his parents, Fred and Joanne Humphries; plus two brothers and two sisters.

Numerous members of the Humphries and Carlton families have supported the St. Lucie Historical Society.

Clayton Humphries focused on the operation of the family's century-old cattle ranch and he was keenly interested in livestock management and improvement of pastures.

Grace S. Bryant

Longtime Historical Society member Grace S. Bryant, a prominent health care professional, cattle rancher and civic benefactor, has died at age 91.

She was born in Washington, D.C. in 1928, trained as a nurse, worked in hospitals and was commissioned in the U.S. Army Nurse Corps. In 1958 she came to Fort Pierce and worked for many years as a surgical nurse at Lawnwood Medical Center. She also was instrumental in starting the nurse education program at Indian River Community College, and in providing scholarships for financially needy students.

With her husband **Bill Bryant**, Gracie raised cattle and was active in local livestock organizations and 4-H programs. Δ

From the Winter 2006 edition

Olive Dame Peterson has been named by the Florida Historical Society the 2006 Caroline P. Rossetter Outstanding Woman in Florida history. The award is named for the late Caroline P. Rosseter who died in 2001....

Only two women have been awarded the honor since [it was established in] 2003. Both have been members of the St. Lucie Historical Society! **Sandra Thurlow** in 2005, and Olive Peterson in 2006 have won well deserved statewide recognition for their lengthy dedication to Florida History. ...

Editor's note: In 2014 St. Lucie Historical Society President Nancy Bennett also received the Rossetter Outstanding Woman in Florida History award.

Olive Dame Peterson is the daughter of Judge Flem Dame. A native of Homerville, Ga., she moved to Florida in 1925, graduating from Fort Pierce High School and Florida State University. ... Olive and her husband [O.C. Peterson] are among the few remaining founding members of the St. Lucie Historical Society in 1952. She has been a member of our board in 1968 and from 1979-83. Her husband served on the board from 1983-85. Mrs. Peterson became president of the Florida Historical Society in 1982, serving until 1984. ...

Carrie Rossetter [for whom the award was named] was born in an era when women were not expected, in some cases not allowed, to participate in mainstream American commerce and leadership. Defying the odds, she took over her father's Standard Oil franchise in 1921 in Melbourne, operating it successfully until she sold it in 1966. She and her sister donated approximately \$500,000 to various organizations promoting Florida history and culture. In 1991 the Rossetter sisters left \$1 million to the Florida Historical Society in addition to their historic house and approximately \$5 million for a Rossetter House Foundation administered by the society. City Clerk of the City of Fort Pierce. A descendant

of the Ordway family kindly donated the Bungalow Apron file and photograph to the Bud Adams Gallery of Vintage Photographs in the Cobb Building.

Edythe Ankeny. The Ankenys were among the earliest settlers along the Indian River with the first Ankeny arriving in 1879. Edythe was Mrs. R. V. Ankeny. We still have Ankenys in the county. Mr. and Mrs. Rollin Ankeny are members of the St. Lucie Historical Society.

Kate Hill. Kate was part of the Hill family of the Florida Photographic Concern, to which we owe so many of the irreplaceable early images of Fort Pierce and vicinity.

Mother **Mary Ordway**, matriarch of the Ordway family.

(Next are McCarty and Adderly)

Margaret Whyte, widow of Richard Whyte, who founded the St. Lucie Ice Company. There was also once a Whyte Fish Company on Cobb's dock. He was once mayor of Fort Pierce and was elected to the State Legislature in 1925.

Rose Ankeny Lewis. Another member of the Ankeny family, Rose Lewis served as president of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs (1918), was the

first woman to hold the office of superintendent of schools (1925-1929) in St. Lucie County, and was a

charter member of the local Daughters of the American Revolution. When this photograph was taken, she had only two more years to live. Mr. Edgar Lewis was a vice president of St. Lucie County Bank.

Katherine Paxton, widow of **Horatio Paxton,** who was a contractor in the early 1900s.

Minnie Tylander. Her husband William

Tylander moved from Orange City to Fort Pierce in 1902 to take over as general manager of East Coast Lumber Co. He organized the Fort Pierce Band. He was later involved in the Fort Pierce Bank and Trust Co. and was very active in the Fort Pierce Chamber of Commerce. He chaired the county's Republican Committee.

Mamie Sample. She was the wife of John Sample, one of three brothers who moved from North Carolina to the Fort Pierce area. All were businessmen and community leaders. The Samples' daughter Mary was the wife of Rupert Koblegard. Mamie Sample was the grandmother of Wendy, Mary Ann and Koby Koblegard.

Elizabeth Moore, a sister of Frances McCarty. The Moores were from North Carolina. Δ

Florida Facts

Marineland, then called Marine Studios, opened on June 23, 1938 near St. Augustine. More than 30,000 tourists, scientists and photographers attended the opening. It was first conceived as an oceanarium that could be used to film marine life. ... The park was very popular with tourists through the 1970s and was used for various movies including "Creature From the Black lagoon." (On This Day in Florida History by Nick Wynn)

The Jacksonville Times-Union announced on Sept. 9, 1918 that season bookings for the Alcazar Hotel in St. Augustine and The Breakers in Palm Beach had been cancelled. The military draft and a mass migration of 500,000 African-Americans to factories in northern cities (between 1916 and 1919) caused a significant shortage of labor. Other industries such as agriculture, lumber and turpentine also were hard hit. (On This Day in Florida History by Nick Wynn
