County fair highlights busy season for historical society

The winter season just ending has been an especially active one for our St. Lucie Historical Society and its members. With thousands of seasonal visitors added to local residents, most cultural and entertainment events were well attended.


In mid-January, the society co-sponsored the annual history festival in downtown Fort Pierce, founded and organized by *Indian River Magazine*. A one-block stretch of South Second Street between Orange and Atlantic avenues was the scene of educational displays, military re-enactors, panel discussions in the Sunrise black-box venue, and much more. SLHS members volunteered at several booths, greeting visitors and explaining aspects of this area's rich history.

An art festival saluting this area's famed Highwaymen landscape painters was a mid-February highlight in the Moore's Creek Park. And as usual, the Saturday morning farmers' markets and monthly Friday Fests drew enthusiastic crowds to Fort Pierce's Marina Square. In addition, SLHS members volunteered at the downtown Sandy Shoes event in March.

The season's most ambitious undertaking by the historical

On Nov. 2, 1983, **Addie Holmes Emerson** died peacefully in her sleep.

Born a cattleman's daughter in Fort Drum 82 years ago, she shared the memories of those early days with us: the welcoming ranch house, visiting Indians with **Polly Parker**, and cow camps with hardworking

cowboys on the open range.

The Holmes family moved to Fort Pierce when Addie was seven years old because her parents desired a good education for their children. She attended the old wooden school on North Second Street near Cobb's Store. When the new, modern yellow brick school on Delaware Avenue was opened in 1915, Addie was there.

Her family operated Holmes Casino and pool where most of Fort Pierce youths learned to swim. And Addie was there.

She grew up, married **Lindsey Emerson**, raised her children **Tom** and **Pugie**, worked with her church and community in Fort Pierce, and stored memories.

But in 1968 when she became director of the St. Lucie County Historical Museum, she helped put those memories back into life. And for thousands of adults and children, visitors and residents, she was Mrs. St. Lucie History because she had lived that history, remembered that history, and told all of us how it was. And we know it would never be that way again.

So, thanks to Addie, our museum contains irreplaceable objects of Florida's history.

Thanks to Addie for tape recordings and pictures of "how it used to be" in St. Lucie County.

Thanks to Addie for years of work in preserving our past for our future.

Thanks to Addie for sharing it all with us.

a full list of SLHS fair volunteers, see the president's message. Our members sold books and distributed pamphlets for the museum. Among the pieces on display were artifacts from old Fort Pierce, antique implements and household items, plus the antique hair-curling machine – always a favorite curiosity item.

Florida Facts

Florida's first newspaper, the East Florida Gazette, was founded in St. Augustine in 1783. (The Florida Handbook)

Educators and civil-rights activists Harry T. and Harriett V. Moore were killed on Christmas Day 1951 when a bomb exploded under their house in the Brevard County community of Mims. No one was ever charged with the murders. A re-investigation by the state in 2006 identified four Ku Klux Klan members as those responsible.

Gov. Lawton Chiles died Dec. 12, 1998 of an apparent heart attack while exercising in the gym of the executive mansion in Tallahassee. He was 68 and near the end of his term in office. Lt.-Gov. Buddy McKay was sworn in as governor to fill the remaining 23 days.

Florida Facts

The American Revolution's "last battle" is reported to have been fought at sea east of Cape Canaveral, March 10, 1783. The Continental frigate Alliance and a French vessel were carrying gold lent by France to the new American government when they encountered three British warships. Alliance damaged one British ship in an exchange of cannon fire, enabling Alliance and the French

ship to escape and complete their mission. This occurred about a year and a half after Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown, and three months after a provisional peace treaty was signed at Paris. In 1986 the Legislature passed a resolution honoring the event as the "Battle of Florida." (The Florida Handbook)

Remembering Bob Cushman, creator of whimsical 'Woogums'

When I was growing up in Fort Pierce during the 1950s there were a lot of interesting characters but the one I remember most was **Bob Cushman**. He was influential in my decision to go to sea in the Navy, as he had been in the Navy and talked about it often.

Bob ran away to sea at age 14 and served in the old China Clipper Ship trade in the Orient. Later he did a hitch in the U.S. Navy in the south Pacific. During World War One he served as a captain in the U.S. Army infantry. After discharge he attended Kansas State University, from which he graduated.

Cushman's death at age 78. He was born July 17, 1891 in Emporia, Kan. A world traveler with a keen interest in ornamental horticulture, he moved to Fort Pierce in 1947 and served for 10 years as superintendent of the city's parks department before retiring. With his home workshop and kiln, the article said, he produced "thousands of his Woogums as ashtrays, dwarf flower holders and whimsical artistic creations that were avidly sought by collectors and gift shops."

He lived at the southeast corner of Twelfth Street and Hibiscus Avenue in a house he designed, just a block from my family's home on Georgia Avenue. Bob's house was fully open on the east side and he could clean house by opening the doors and squirting it down with a garden hose, then just mop it dry. As a young man this, to me, seemed the epitome of relaxed and sensible living.

Bob was a close friend of Beanie Backus and

a social acquaintance with many locals including Wilma and Pete Cowles, with whom he spent many a Sunday afternoon. Their daughter, Hart Stephenson, recalls playing with her friends in Bob's jungle of a back yard while the grownups visited on the east patio.

He was known for his interest in horticulture and had a large greenhouse in which he raised orchids. Attached to his greenhouse he had a small pottery

shed. There he made, among other things, his popular ceramic "Woogums." These were delightful creations of frog-like creatures with extra-long legs and arms, attached to mugs, ashtrays, etc.

Harold Holtsberg remembers ordering individualized Woogums as gifts. He ordered one of a Woogum playing poker for his brother-in-law, and one smoking a big cigar for his uncle. Bob only charged \$4 or \$5 each for these special-order items.

These Woogums, because of their long, thin arms and legs, were very fragile. There probably are very few left. If any historical society member has a Woogum, we would like to take a photo of it for our archives. Δ
