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SLHS member describes cattle ranching life to new History Club at Fort Pierce Central High School

The St. Lucie Historical Society is supporting a recently formed student organization, the History Club at Fort Pierce Central High School. This project had its origin last year in discussions between F.P. Central teacher Sharon Ortiz and SLHS board member Jon Bell.

Based on enthusiastic student interest, the new school group recently hosted a talk by SLHS board member Rick Modine on this area's pioneer cattle industry. Rick, a member of the prominent Carlton cattle ranching family, addressed more than two dozen Central students on Feb. 23.

He displayed some ranching tools and artifacts, and explained how this area's early ranchers went about their work. Rick said he counted 31 students who attended the program. "They were a diverse group and listened very intently. They asked questions and they were intelligent questions."

Planning is under way for another program before the end of the school years, and for future programs on a variety of topics. In addition to visiting our museum on Seaway Drive in Fort Pierce, club members want to tour other museums and historic sites in this area. At its April 10 meeting, the SLHS board discussed the potential sharing of educational materials with the Central High School History Club members, also how the club might help in our society's future projects. The historical society also could award occasional grants of funds to help the school club's educational activities.

Our historical society's mission includes educational component, as we seek to increase knowledge this area's history among young people. Support of student history clubs could become one of our most important projects. ∆

The St. Lucie Historical Society recently hosted a festive salute to the Fort Pierce Police Department for a full century of service to the city and its people. The event drew a large crowd, including local dignitaries, to the SLHS dinner meeting on March 16 at the Elks Lodge.

SLHS to host history festival next January at museum

The St. Lucie Historical Society's board of directors has voted to host next year's annual history festival at the St. Lucie County Regional History Center on Seaway Drive. The event is set for Saturday January 13.

This popular festival was originated by Indian River Magazine and in recent years was held in and around the Sunrise Theatre in downtown Fort Pierce. This year the historical society co-sponsored the event.

Preliminary planning is under way. The festival is expected to include special exhibits and activities inside the museum and around its grounds, entertainment, speakers and discussions on local topics, historical re-enactors and more. A fish fry by the Summerlin family also is planned.

The SLHS board is seeking exhibitors and vendors for the event, plus volunteers to help with essential tasks. Δ

Visitor activity remains brisk, students, tourists enjoy museum

Visitor traffic through the St. Lucie County Regional History Center maintained a brisk pace through the spring. SLHS President Nancy Bennett reported at the board's April 10 meeting that tour groups from area schools continued to increase recently. There had been a substantial downturn during the COVID pandemic.

"We had over 100 students last week," Nancy told board members, with another 40-member class scheduled for a tour in the next few days.

In addition, she said, the museum continues to be

a popular attraction among out-of-state visitors, and even among tourists from overseas.

Interestingly, many longtime local residents express surprise that the museum even exists, based on comments made at the historical society's county fair exhibit. Many locals still have never heard about it. Yet increasingly, foreign tourists learn about the museum and arrive here eager to see it. Perhaps locals tend to overlook points of interest close to home. Meanwhile, foreign tourists often seek information on interesting attractions while planning trips to this area. Δ

Florida Facts

On Oct. 13, 1947 Weeki Wachee Springs opened as a tourist attraction in Hernando County. It featured young women dressed as mermaids, breathing through underwater air hoses. The natural spring also offered boat rides, swimming and other activities. Weeki Wachee was among Florida's most

popular attractions during the 1950s but in more recent decades lost visitors to Orlando-area theme parks. Weeki Wachee is now a state park. Its spring is 407 feet deep, the deepest freshwater cave system in the continental United States. Δ

Alto Lee Adams III

Prominent rancher and civic benefactor **Alto Lee Adams III** died Jan. 1 at age 72. He was born Oct. 23, 1950, grew up in St. Lucie County and spent most of his life residing at the Adams family ranch west of Fort Pierce. He was vice president of the family corporation, which also included ranch properties near Kenansville and Madison.

He was a longtime member of the Florida Cattlemen's Association and was an advocate for land and wildlife conservation. His family generously supported many worthy causes.

He is predeceased by his parents, **Alto Lee Adams**Jr. and **Dorothy Snively Adams**. Surviving him are his wife, **Cynthia Carreno Adams**, five children and six grandchildren, plus two brothers, **Michael Adams** and **Robert Adams**.

Ronald B. Waites

St. Lucie Historical Society member Ronald Bryan "Ron" Waites died Jan. 26 at age 80. An Alabama native, he came to Fort Pierce as a child with his parents Bryan and Ruth Waites and was a 1960 graduate of Dan McCarty High School.

After graduating from Barry University, Ron Waites spent most of his business career in Miami before relocating to Stuart in retirement. He was a familiar presence at SLHS dinner meetings.

He is survived by his wife, Margaret "Maggie" Waites, three daughters, seven grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. He was predeceased by his parents and by a brother, Michael Waites.

Patricia Sue Carroll Priest

St. Lucie Historical Society member Patricia "Patsy" Priest died Feb. 24 at age 84. She was a fifth-generation native Floridian, born to Aaron Dennis Carroll and Lucille Bass Carroll. She was a 1956 graduate of Boone High School in Orlando. The family lived in various Florida localities before coming to Fort Pierce.

She spent most of her career as an elementary school teacher in St. Lucie County and had a strong interest in genealogy and Florida history.

She is survived by four sons, **Jeffrey**, **Roger**, **Bradley** and **Gary Priest**; also two brothers and one sister, plus six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. Δ
